Year Five had a fab art lesson creating bioluminescent jelly fish with handmade scratch paper and carving tools. Awesome effort, they all look great!






Sports Leaders

Explosive science


Year 8 have been learning about Group 1 elements in the periodic table, investigating what happens when each of them react with water. Mr Ramshaw demonstrated the reactions of lithium, sodium and potassium, however was unable to get his hands on any rubidium and caesium! Just as well when the pupils saw the catastrophic effects of these metals when added to water, in the videos that they watched!





Solving problems

Year 5 have been problem solving in maths. They have been practicing how to think about tackling a problem, then talking and listening to their friends and then having a go. Some pupils found it quite tricky when they didn't get the answer straight away, but with some perseverance they got there in the end.





Breaking it down

Year 5 have also been working with the cuisenaire rods to explore equivalent fractions, percentages and decimals.







'Fortnite - Battle Royale.' is a free to play section of the game 'Fortnite.' The game sees 100 players dropped on to an island from a 'battle bus.' where they have to compete until one survivor remains. The last remaining player on the island wins the game. Players have to find hidden items, such as weapons, to help them survive longer in the game.

To make the game more challenging, there is an added twist called 'the storm' which reduces the size of the island from the start of gameplay, bringing the players closer together in proximity. The game is available on PC, PlayStation 4, Xbox One, Mac and iOS.

Newly featured items are released daily and are only available to purchase within 24 hours of their release.
